As we flip through our album, we find Olive Brake Dix (left), her son, Philip Arthur Dix (right), and Philip's daughter Eva Dix Druehl, holding her son, William Druehl. Olive (1830-1914) was a descendant of Edward Jackson (Olive Brake⁴, Mary H.³, Edward², John Jackson¹). She and her husband, John George Dix, were residents of the Pringle Tree community of Upshur County, (West) Virginia and raised five children. Philip, Olive's second child, was a graduate of Alleghany College, He was associated with the railroad in Hawarden, Iowa, then moved to Salt Lake City, Utah and practiced law. Later, he operated a nursery. Eva (1883-1984), oldest child of Philip and Goulia Sears Dix, married William Charles Druehl, a Salt Lake City merchant. Later, the Druehls moved to Burlingame, California, where Eva was active in church and social affairs. She participated in the United Methodist Women and was a charter member of the Anson Burlingame Chapter, Daughters of the American Revolution.
