What is Urban Night Photography?



Considerations

- Light, color and tone each take on different characteristics in the absence of daylight. Sometimes this will lead to wonderful discoveries.
- Almost always dealing with multiple types of light sources
- A bit more complicated than traditional landscape photography
 At the mercy of the available light cast by streetlamps, building lighting and of course vehicle lights....so basically the reason you are out there works against you.
- Lighting, Time, White Balance, & Focusing

Lighting



Lance Keimig

- Sunlight Deep shadows, with midtones and bright highlights
- Urban Night Many different localized light sources creating a "sea of darkness punctuated by pools of light" that produce shadows and highlights of a greater range than the capabilities of the camera

Time of Night

- Time of night can be quite important.
- Temptation is to go for the night when the sky is completely black.
 Minimize the sky's inclusion is an option.
- Earlier in the evening however the lighting on buildings doesn't appear quite so strong although there might still be some color in the sky which is more appealing.

Focusing

- Live View Mode I use this more here than any other photography type
 Battery Hog!
- Manual vs Autofocus
 - In very low light conditions I use manual focus to prevent the lens from searching InfinityFlashlight technique
- Live View \rightarrow magnifying glass buttons to zoom into your area of focus \rightarrow Manually focus

Camera Settings w/Tripod

- ISO = 100
- RAW
- Aperture Mode 85% Shutter Priority 15%
- Bracketing turned on
- Vibration Reduction TURNED OFF
- White Balance
 - Generally on for at least the first shot
 - Generally meter of a white or grey building
 - Raw = Easier to correct for the what I want

But I don't have my tripod

Raise ISO

- Brace yourself in a good shooting posture
- 5+ images at exactly the same exposure
- Shutter speed high enough to get a good quality image handheld.
- Put the camera on slow or fast continuous shooting mode and fire off the images quickly.
- Image Stacking in Photoshop
- Combining multiple identical images will reduce noise.
- Photoshop will make an attempt to align the slight discrepancies in the position of each image.
- Only works well on relatively static subjects
- Works with JPEG or RAW


Perspective correction & barrel distortion is vital

More than most other types of photography, cityscapes have an abundance of horizontal and vertical lines.


Unedited Midrange Shot




How to HDR in Lightroom 1
